

1.5 Past Continuous Tense: "when"

We often use the **past continuous tense** with the word "when," to talk about **two things that were happening at the same time.** Look at this sentence pattern:

[past continuous] when [past tense]

I was talking on the phone <u>when the doorbell rang.</u> He was eating dinner <u>when the phone rang.</u> She was doing her homework <u>when she fell asleep.</u> It was raining <u>when I went to school.</u> We were fighting <u>when my mother came home.</u>
