

“Get” Phrasal Verbs (1) - Definitions

There are many **phrasal verbs** that begin with the word “get.” In this section, you will learn many of these.

get on: to enter (a train, bus, motorcycle)

- Hurry and get on the train! It’s leaving soon!

get off: to exit (a train, bus, motorcycle)

- We need to get off the bus at the next stop.

get in (get into): to enter (a car, the ocean)

- She can’t get in the taxi because there’s not enough room.

get out of: to exit (a car, the ocean); to leave

- It’s starting to rain, so we should get out of the swimming pool.
-

get back (from): to return from a place

- My aunt will get back from her vacation tonight.
-

get up: to rise/stand; to wake up

- You look tired! What time did you get up this morning?
-

get along (with): to have a good relationship with someone

- I don’t get along with Dave. He always picks on me.

get together (with): to meet with

- Let’s get together with Brenda this weekend! She’s a lot of fun!
