Instead of / Rather than

Sentence Pattern: A instead of B A rather than B

Instead of and **rather than** mean "in place of".

- My wife wanted to buy a new car, but I decided to buy a used car.
 - → I bought a used car **instead of** a new car.
 - → I bought a used car rather than a new car.
- Everyone ordered chicken at the restaurant, but because I had chicken for dinner last night, I decided to order the fish.
 - →I ordered the fish instead of the chicken.
 - → I ordered the fish rather than the chicken.
- It's a nice day today, so I didn't drive my car. I walked to work.
 - → I walked to work instead of driving.
 - → I walked to work rather than driving.

Note: If "A" and "B" are verbs, you must add "-ing" to the verb after instead of/rather than:

- Wrong: I went running instead of ride a bike. (x)
- Right: I went running instead of riding a bike.
- Right: I went running rather than riding a bike.
- Wrong: John decided to play video games rather than do his homework. (x)
- Right: John decided to play video games rather than doing his homework.
- Right: John decided to play video games instead of doing his homework.
